Together we have to be strong and witness God's love in our lives, especially in our prayer life.

I hope that I can return to Egypt sometime in the future in order to complete the work I started there. And it would be good to be able to share with you some of what I have been doing and exploring, but that will have to wait for now.

So this is the first of our newsletters and if you have any items of news you would like to share then please forward it to me.

Rita, Ruth and I are hoping that we are keeping in touch with you either through a pastoral visitor, this communication or by us contacting you, but if you hear of anyone that is feeling isolated then do contact us and we will follow that up. We are all trying to be careful and follow government guidelines so unless there is an emergency we will not make a personal visit. Please continue to hold us in prayer.

We look to the future in the knowledge that God is with us and we can continue strong in his name.

I hope that you can draw comfort from the words of this hymn.
