# MINISTER'S LETTER

*The Minister's Letter for this edition takes the form of an interview between the Editor and our Superintendent Minister, Rev Jacqui Horton.*

**1. I believe this is your first, and therefore only, Superintendency. What led you to apply to be a Superintendent?**

Well, yes, although I was twice an acting Superintendent in two different Circuits previously so I had had some experience. I had declined to be considered for the job proper in years gone by partly because I didn't think I was up to the administrative/legal side and partly because I felt very much called to the pioneering and community side of my role in the Norwich Circuit (Wymondham, Attleborough & 4 villages). However, because I had been so involved, particularly in Wymondham, I couldn't imagine how I could start doing something similar all over again and I felt that God was calling me to a new challenge. Having reached the ripe old age of 61 I also thought that, if I concentrated very hard, I could probably cope with the administration!

**2. What hope and aspirations for the Circuit did you have when you first arrived?**

I knew that three Circuits had come together (or was it more??) and that, as in many other places, it was difficult for people to feel that they were part of the wider group. I was looking forward to offering leadership at Circuit level and hoped that I could make a difference in how church members related to the Circuit structure.

**3. Clearly Covid had a dramatic effect of church life for everyone. You reacted in a remarkable way (well over 200 Worship at Home sheets for example). Do you think Covid complemented or harmed your original intentions?**

Of course I had never given a thought to the sort of situation that we found ourselves in in March 2020. I had only been in post for 6 months and now we were all grounded! It can only have been divine prompting that gave me the idea of getting a paper Worship Sheet out that first Sunday, I was so concerned that a. people should be able to worship at home and b. that we should stay together as a Methodist community. I am amazed that I have been able to produce this resource for over 4 years now (albeit in a shorter version since Easter 2023) and that people are still using it for DIY Home Worship. I feel as though Covid fast-tracked a process that may not otherwise have happened. It did feel rather as though I was the right person in the right place at the right time (not a feeling that I was used to previously!) and that, through Worship Sheets, other DIY prayer resources, social media, Tuesday at 7 zooms and eventually circuit zoom services (in the 3<sup>rd</sup> lockdown 2021), the Circuit did come together and become a community. When the Staff were discussing how this community feeling might continue, Rev Cliff suggested that we had an occasional 'Big Sunday'. The Big Sunday has evolved into a quarterly event where the whole Circuit has the same worship material and where the Staff are ministering to everyone on the same theme on the same day – which is great.

**4. Do you think that Covid was God-inspired, God-tolerated or God-irrelevant?**

I never think that God causes events that result in human suffering. But God obviously allows them and uses them. I believe that, if we co-operate with God in bad situations, then those situations can be transformed and amazing things can happen. The Holy Spirit undoubtedly was able to work through Covid in all sorts of ways.

It's very easy, especially if we are in one of the smaller churches, to think that not a lot seems to be happening. sense of humour) is the way that so many churches seem to think that the way they do things is the only way they can be done. (In my early years as I was greeting the departing congregation a steward was welcoming back someone who hadn't been for a while. "How nice to see you again," they said, "I'm so sorry it wasn't our usual service." 'One up to me' was my quiet reaction!)

The serious side to this is that, while we like to remain in our comfort zone with God, we need to be ready to answer his call to do whatever he wants. You are probably tired of hearing about our long-planned development at Holt but what started as a suggestion to remove a false ceiling is now becoming a much greater involvement in our local community who will therefore not only get to know who we are but why we do what we do.

So enjoy your read and perhaps, just perhaps, think 'We could try that too'. Pet service, anyone?

# MINISTER'S LETTER

Continued

## 5. What has been your biggest disappointment and your biggest joy in your superintendency?

I am not sure that I have any disappointments or that I have received joy as such through the role – sorry! However, there have been many difficult things and many, many satisfactions. Superintendents in this day and age have to cope with a vast array of managerial issues, compliance requirements, legal problems, financial headaches (especially when the Circuit Treasurer becomes seriously ill...) and, still, they have to take services, be pastorally available to people, offer leadership to churches, take funerals, I could go on. None of this is easy and should only really be undertaken by those who are called to it in my view (otherwise, it would be impossible).

But the satisfactions are many and deep. Off the top of my head, it is very satisfying that I will leave the Circuit with an active Facebook page, a presentable website, a system of Big Sundays, Fellowship Services to compensate for the lack of sufficient preaching availability (with training offered by Rev Anne), a scheme for the finances that has so far gone to plan, Circuit and LPWL meetings that are reasonably well attended and where people support each other (and that finish on time!), and a cohesive Leadership Team where different people are using their gifts to fulfil various roles.

P.S. Pure joy has probably come through local church and community involvement. I think of the Methodist Church's involvement in 'Carter 22' (the commemoration of Howard Carter's finding of Tutankhamun's tomb in Swaffham in 2022) and my mosaic triangle representing Swaffham MC at the top of the mosaic pyramid in London Street. I think of displays of nativity sets affecting people outside the Church (in Watton, Litcham, Swaffham and, this year, a primary school), I think of washing up for an hour after a soup lunch (Tittleshall), of confirmations of people who have been church attenders for years, of planting a tree in the community (Hingham), of running competitions and games for a small coffee morning in the school holidays with the involvement of young teenagers (Great Ellingham), of All-Age Parade Services with Brownies/Guides, and the 5 children (from one extended family) that I will be baptising in June (Swaffham).

## 6. [The naughty question] Do you enjoy Circuit Meetings?

My experience over 24 years of being a minister is that Church Councils and Circuit Meetings are not meant to be enjoyed as such! But, I have been pleased to lead them and, again, it is satisfying when they go well and I feel that I have handled them ok.

As I said above, I think you have to be called to be a Superintendent just like you have to be called to be a minister. I wasn't called to this wider leadership role for the first 19 years but for the last 5, I know that it has been God's purpose for my life and ministry. Overall, I have enjoyed being a Superintendent, there is very little I regret and much that I am pleased about. I have done my best, God's resourcing and strength has seen me through. As I have got older I have become more and more dependent on God's power rather than my own which makes me want to finish with a quote:

*'Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit', says the Lord Almighty (Zechariah 4 v 6)*

# SHEILA

1942.

Firstly, may I say a big thankyou to everyone who has been in contact with me since Sheila passed away on February 4th., and also those who joined me to celebrate Sheila's life in a packed Litcham chapel on February 26th., which was also the 52nd. anniversary of our wedding which also took place at the same venue.

Can I also thank Deacon Jen for leading the service of cremation at Mintlyn, and for co-hosting the celebration of Sheila's life alongside the Rev. Andrew King who we were delighted to welcome back among us.



I first met Sheila Mary Wagg on Wednesday October 18th. 1967 at around 7.25pm. You will have to forgive me for not being more precise! The reason I can be this accurate is that this was the second rehearsal we had of a band I had put together that would become the Messengers which I wrote about in some detail a few issues ago of the Link, so I won't bore you with the details again.

We hadn't been able to find a keyboard player for the first rehearsal, and Sheila was suggested by one of the members and came along to the second rehearsal. She would be the first to admit that she wasn't the greatest player in the world, (Harsh, but true!), but she was a good singer and became a regular member of the band.

I remember our first date which was in February 1968 when we went to the famous Kings Lynn Mart. The plan was that six of us would go along together, three fellas and three girls, but the other two guys dropped out so it was just me and three young ladies.

Our early courtship travelled a rocky road. As I'm sure most of you will know, Sheila was a few years older than me, and we had to struggle against quite a lot of opposition. However, we persevered and I think our 52 years of married life speaks for itself.

Our one regret that we were not able to have children, due to a medical problem caused when I contracted teenage meningitis. We did explore adoption, but, in those less enlightened days, were not considered suitable as Sheila was at that point working as a Site Warden on the Sheltered Housing scheme where I am still living. Apparently it was not considered a suitable environment in which to raise children. Thankfully society has moved on since then.

# LYNN

## 2024

The church was always central in our lives, and particularly church music. After leaving the Messengers we formed The Open Doors along with our friend Frances Singleterry, and we travelled many miles together carrying the Gospel right across the Eastern Counties for many years.

Unfortunately Sheila's life was increasingly blighted by the twin curses of IBS and osteoarthritis, which increasingly curtailed her ability to travel, which was a great sadness to her.

We had enjoyed travelling throughout Europe, and had taken our music into mainland Spain, along with the Balearic and Canary Islands. We also sang in Malta and Cyprus along with what was then Yugoslavia, now Croatia.

Among the hobbies Sheila enjoyed was knitting, and many generations of families have been clad in garments she knitted. This led to the then Minister at Swaffham, the Rev. Jane Sperring, to ask if she could possibly knit a Nativity set which could be safely used with young children. This led to many requests for similar sets, and I know that they are still being used all over the country and beyond with sets in New Zealand, Canada the United States and Spain, a lasting testament to Sheila's great gift.

As well as serving Methodism in our home church in Litcham, Sheila was a great supporter of Circuit events, and was a particular rock to me during the time I spent as Circuit Steward. She was also a great supporter of Action for Children, and was a member of the Circuit Support Group for many years.

She was always very self-conscious of the scar over her top lip caused by repeated surgery to repair the cleft palate and hare lip which she was born with. As a result she hated having her photograph taken. Ironically, hardly anyone who I have spoken to about this weren't even aware of it. All they saw was Sheila, and it will always be a matter of great regret to me that she didn't know this.

As a result of this we made the decision to use her passing as a means of raising funds for Smile Train, a charity which provides corrective surgery for cleft-palate children all over the world. The cost varies from country to country, but in some third world countries this operation can be performed for as little as £4. To date Sheila's fund has raised over a thousand pounds, which potentially means that around 250 children may have had this life changing surgery. Sheila is at peace now in the Kingdom of God, and I thank Him for bringing her to me, and for the many blessed years and adventures we shared together.

We opened the coffee shop in October 23, it is now 6 months old. It was with much thought and trepidation, and against some doubters, that we decided to launch on the first Saturday each month.

We had been invited to visit Hingham's coffee shop, which runs on Saturdays, and saw how well that worked, with that in mind we based our working practices on Hingham's tried and tested model. So with helpful advice from the ladies there, we made the splash.

We

advertised well, with 500 flyers being distributed, all within walking distance of the chapel, posters and online local websites. We were delighted with the response on the first month making over £250.

We now have a settled core of helpers and beginning to have regular visitors each month. We offer coffee or tea,



with scones for £1.00 each with a waitress service for our visitors. The main attraction is our home made cake stall, offering cakes, pies and sausage rolls, this sells out most months, first come, first served! We also have a tombola, books and bric-a-brac and home made cards as regulars. We also try to have a guest stall each month: i.e. wood turning, craft, stained glass, and Green Pastures Bible Shop. These are advertised on our outside notice boards each month and online.



To date we have raised £500 for the church funds, with still some in hand for charity donations and hopefully some projects within the church. We look forward to enjoying our Saturday coffee shop for as long as we are supported.


## PET SERVICE AT SWAFFHAM

Transformational Leadership is an initiative which comes under the Methodist church's programme for Evangelism and Growth. The Methodist website, which has recently undergone a comprehensive refresh and is well worth a look, describes Transformational Leadership in this way:

"Transformational leadership is about churches, circuits, New Places for New People (NPNPs) and Church at the Margins (CaMs) making the main thing, the main thing: speaking of, listening for, and living out the Good News of God's love in Jesus. It's about being prepared to transform for the sake of transformation in the world God loves, recognising that the Church is there for the benefit of the whole world. It's about being open to growth of all kinds: growing disciples; growing in love for our communities; growing and deepening relationships; and, by God's grace, growing in number too."


In April, Sarah and Geraldine were invited to present a live webinar about The Hive. This article is about that webinar, demonstrated through some of the powerpoint slides that were used together with the explanations that went alongside.

We began by describing how The Hive came into being: searching for a future use for a



chapel whose community was no longer able to look forward, even though it had a rich and vibrant history. With The Hive, we are able to keep that story going and growing and we can reach out to new people by offering opportunities to take part in a programme of creativity, spirituality and well-being and to be part of a new community.

We spoke about the many people who had contributed to the journey at The Hive, bringing their skills at different times and for different reasons and always to be part of a community which is looking for a contemporary understanding of God in the world as creator, companion and catalyst. As the hymn says, “many the gifts, many the people, many the hearts that yearn to belong.”



We talked about our values and the importance of these, both for ourselves in reminding and remembering the purpose of The Hive, and also as a template for how we interact with others. The Hive is a place of listening for both the spoken and the unspoken and often it is the unspoken which resonates most loudly. The Hive is also a place of sharing – giving and receiving in equal measure without expectation but often bringing the unexpected!

For many people on the live presentation, the way in which we prioritised clear branding from the outset, came as something of a revelation. What does the branding say? It speaks of the on-going life of the chapel; it describes what we do; it promotes a welcome. It is clear, colourful and consistent. It was also arrived at collaboratively, through consultation and consensus. (That’s probably enough c-words for now!)



The Transformational Leadership initiative has recently been newly-named, ‘Leading into Change.’ At its heart is the aspiration to encourage and embrace the energy and experience of lay people, involving them more specifically in the leadership of both traditional and new expressions of church and Christian community. Here we were able to highlight, through our experience of The Hive, what lay people have to offer.

## A catalyst for change?

What can the lay community, both volunteers and paid workers, bring?

- Lay people can bring time, energy and focus
- Lay people can bring skills, experience and vision
- Lay people can prioritise collaboration and reduce hierarchy
- Lay people can promote equality, diversity and inclusion
- Lay people can maximise people engagement
- Lay people can bypass (some) gatekeepers
- Lay people can take responsibility without exerting authority
- Lay people can form a national network of shared experience

Let's be clear – this is not a break-away movement. In simple terms, it is the added value that lay people have long-wanted but have, perhaps, not always had the opportunity or confidence to bring. The importance of staying connected cannot be over-estimated and Connexion has always been mindful of this and careful to provide a context which is

inclusive, encouraging and purposeful. (CLF stands for Connexional Leaders' Forum.)

We concluded with three 'learnings' from our experience at The Hive – rhythms, listening and journeying.

We also shared some feedback and they shall have the last words!

"It's so good to see the Church in use rather than up for sale."

## Staying connected

Our Calling stated in 2000 and revived in 2018 as follows - The CLF and the Council agreed **priority** areas for focus in the context of responding to and reaffirming *Our Calling* and which needed attention by the Church which were:

- To make more followers of Jesus Christ through mission and evangelism
- To help members deepen their faith and to put their faith into action (discipleship)
- To find ways to support the improvement in the quality of worship offered to God
- To support the development of District and Circuit mission plans
- To grow the number, variety and breadth of vocations
- To develop the property of the Church to support mission and evangelism
- To be a more inclusive and welcoming Church

Rhythms at The Hive are our reliable welcome and our fluid outlook on inclusivity and participation – no rules, no rotas, no restrictions.


### We have learned about listening


